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Embracing Carers[™] is an initiative led by Merck, in collaboration with nine leading carer organizations around the world, designed to increase awareness, discussion, and action about the oftenoverlooked needs of carers.



When AMMF was founded and registered with the Charity Commission in 2002, we believe it was the world's first charity dedicated solely to cholangiocarcinoma. It was then, and remains, the UK's only dedicated cholangiocarcinoma charity.

Over recent years an enormous and extremely worrying worldwide increase in cholangiocarcinoma's incidence has been noted. Robust statistics are difficult to come by, but the NCIN/Cancer52 report, published in 2015*, records that there were 2,161 deaths caused by cholangiocarcinoma in 2013 in England alone. The incidence appears to be increasing across all age groups, including younger people, and the cause of this ongoing increase is unknown. Much more research is desperately needed.

AMMF is wholly dedicated to tackling this devastating cancer on all fronts: providing information and support, campaigning to raise awareness, and encouraging and supporting specialised research teams in their work towards better diagnostic techniques and treatments and, ultimately a cure.

Dedicated to bringing about improvement for the cholangiocarcinoma patient, AMMF works closely throughout the UK with patients and their carers, clinicians, healthcare professionals, researchers, politicians and policy makers, as well as actively collaborating internationally.

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WORLD CHOLANGIOCARCINOMA DAY

AMMF strongly believes collaboration is the way towards progress, and is proud to have instigated the first World Cholangiocarcinoma Day in 2016. Each year since then, along with fellow inaugural partners – from Thailand: The CCA Foundation of Thailand and CASCAP, and from the USA: the Cholangiocarcinoma Foundation, TargetCancer Foundation and the Bili Project Foundation – the charity has continued to work with this project as its influence grows.

With an active social media presence, World Cholangiocarcinoma Day 2019 reached an amazing 33,644 newsfeeds via Facebook and 22,000 Twitter impressions on this one day.

Throughout 2018, AMMF worked with SES (Scientific Education Support) towards broadening the reach and the scope of World Cholangiocarcinoma Day, building on the existing foundations to further extend this venture with a nationally neutral but globally inclusive voice to address the unmet needs in cholangiocarcinoma.

An international workshop was held in London in September 2018, attended by all the World Cholangiocarcinoma Day partners and other CCA specialists and reseachers, to discuss and plan the future of the venture. One of the outcomes of the workshop, and of the ongoing work of all the partners, is that World Cholangiocarcinoma Day this year saw the launch of a further collaborative venture, the Global Cholangiocarcinoma Alliance.

Date for the future

The date for World Cholangiocarcinoma Day has now been set as 12th of each February – Cholangiocarcinoma Awareness Month.

Leading cholangiocarcinoma specialists and patient advocates from around the world shared their vision to make significant and increased global awareness and progress for cholangiocarcinoma's diagnosis, treatment, cure, and eventual eradication.

The Global Cholangiocarcinoma Alliance – Sharing the same vision with closer global collaboration

The new Alliance intends to launch a comprehensive portfolio of initiatives to provide the global cholangiocarcinoma community with a platform to build links and exchange knowledge to deliver the shared vision, and is set to provide researchers and cancer specialists with the opportunity to collaborate and come together to exchange ideas, irrespective of geography.

The Alliance hopes to build greater global collaborations by establishing training and

exchange programmes and catalysing scientific innovation by hosting international meetings and workshops to further unite the cholangiocarcinoma community to influence global research policy.


